Annual Report for Fiscal Year Ending June 30, 2018

The 2017 Grand List was signed by January 31, 2018 in accordance with the Connecticut General Statutes. Real estate increased .4%. Personal property decreased 1.66% and motor vehicles increased 1.93%. The total taxable Grand List for 2017 was \$351,754,878 which is comprised of 1921 taxable parcels, 275 personal property accounts and 4244 motor vehicles. There were 195 exempt parcels totaling \$102,386,180. The overall increase in the grand list from 2016 was less than 1% at .6%.

BOARD OF ASSESSMENT APPEALS

ANNUAL REPORT - 2017-2018

The Board of Assessment Appeals is one of the oldest local government agencies in Connecticut. The Board is comprised of three (3) elected members, currently Raymond Wishart, John A. Dilorio and Peter Mann. Nicholas Gardner had served as Chairman for several years until November 2017. We thank him for his dedicated service. The purpose of the Board is to provide an avenue for Pomfret taxpayers to appeal the value placed on their properties. The Board is not an assessing agency and does not value taxable property. That is the Assessor's job. The Board of Assessment Appeals is a review body, and as such serves independently of the Assessor.

The Board generally meets twice a year, as defined by Connecticut State Statute. The meeting held in March gives taxpayers an opportunity to appeal real estate values. This meeting requires the taxpayer to request a hearing in writing. Subsequently, a time is designated to hear their appeal. The September meeting gives taxpayers the opportunity to appeal motor vehicle values. A written request is not required and taxpayers are handled on a walk-in basis.

It is important to note that Connecticut statutes require the taxpayer, or legal representative, be present for the hearing. If the taxpayer does not appear, the appeal cannot be heard.

In September 2017, the Board heard 3 appeals for motor vehicle values. Assessments were reduced by a total of \$5,660. In March 2018 the Board received 6 appeals of value on the 2017 Grand List. Assessments were reduced by a total of \$124,000.

Board of Finance 2018 Annual Report

We are pleased to present this summary of the financial conditions of the Town of Pomfret for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2018.

Audit

The Town's auditors, King, King & Associates, presented the 2017-2018 annual audit in January, 2019. The fund balance shows an increase due to revenues exceeding projections. The Board of Education also finished the year under their projected spending level.

Town Unrestricted Reserve Fund

The unrestricted fund balance continued to show improvement and continues to fall within the auditor's recommended range of 10-15%. The Board used \$166,000 from the general fund to support the 2017-2018 spending projections.

2017-2018 Budget

The total 2017-2018 approved budget for the Town was \$12,517,877 with the Board of Education's budget at \$10,051,463 and the General Government budget at \$2,466,414. This represented an increase of less than 1% over the previous year's budget.

Public invited

The Board of Finance meets the second Monday of the month in the Pomfret Community School conference room with special budget workshops in April and May as needed. All meetings are open to the public and we encourage public participation. The Board of Finance schedules a Public Hearing in the spring to hear public comments and questions on proposed spending. After the hearing the Board holds a special meeting to make their budget recommendations. These recommendations are presented to the Board of Selectmen, and they in turn set a Town Meeting.

Board of Selectmen Annual Report - 2018

The Board of Selectmen met 22 times this fiscal year, made appointments to Pomfret's Agriculture, Economic Planning and Development, Inland Wetlands, and Conservation Commissions as well as the chairman to Board of Finance, Green Team, Agent for the Elderly, Veterans Agent and Town Attorney.

Presentations from the Fire Marshall, Emergency Management Director, TEEG, Agricultural Commission, and Solarize CT were made to the board and the full board attended an emergency response exercise for training.

Town government completed another year in good financial and physical condition. Our unreserved General Fund was \$1,599,000 at year end in June 2018. This is about 12% of our annual budget and well within recommended limits. The Board of Finance transferred \$166,000 from our reserves to balance the budget and reduce the mill rate this year.

Grants for Neglected Cemeteries, administration fees for the TAP Grant, and Energize CT were awarded to the Town. Several projects were started or completed this year including the Fire Station addition, approval of the \$5.3 million Transportation Alternatives Program Grant, installation of the Route 169/44 sidewalk and renovations to the Community Senior Center basement and Food Pantry.

Our 2017 grand list increased by .6 % to \$351,754,878. We have about 4,200 residents and are the home to 4,244 registered motor vehicles. The tax collection rate in 2018 was 98.2% for the current year compared to the current year levy.

Housing stats for single family units increased from 5 in fiscal year end June 30, 2017 to 10 in fiscal year end June 30, 2018. Pomfret is a desirable place for professionals to relocate to while commuting for employment to Providence, Worcester, Boston and surrounding cities. Our rural appeal is a result of the strong mindset of open space preservation our residents hold. This year we had a total of 2,726 registered voters.

Pomfret's town government is strong as measured by staff, citizen volunteers (in excess of 60) and customer satisfaction. We are customer friendly with a town hall full of professionals who cheerfully answer questions, assist taxpayers and fulfill their other numerous duties. Together the Town employees and Town citizens make Pomfret a better place to live.

Maureen A. Nicholson, First Selectman, is Pomfret's Open Burning Official. There is, also, one deputy, Cheryl A. Grist. For the convenience of Pomfret residents, the open burning permits may be obtained from these officials during the regular hours of the Town Clerk's Office: Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday from 8:30 A.M. to 5:00 P.M., Wednesday from 8:30 A.M. to 6:00 P.M., and Friday closed. At this time, there is no fee for this service.

One-hundred ninety (190) permits were issued during the annual year of 2018 which was forty-seven (47) more permits than the one-hundred forty-three (143) issued in 2017. This was a 33% increase over last year. Some of this may be due to tree damage from storms and gypsy moth devastation.

Permits are issued for brush fires only and are usually good for one month. Burning when permitted may begin at 10:00 A.M., must be extinguished by 5:00 P.M. and attended at all times. Applicants must call the Quinebaug Valley Dispatch phone number (860) 774-7555 each day before burning to inquire if burning is allowed. The applicant must also call the Dispatch number each day to report when they are beginning to burn and when they are finished. For air quality reasons, burning should not take place when the wind is under 5 mph or over 15 mph, if it is cloudy, rainy, and/or too humid.

The Selectmen's Office may request any information and impose any conditions that may be deemed necessary to protect the health and safety of the citizens of Pomfret.

Annual Report Pomfret Economic Planning & Development Commission 2018

The purpose of the Pomfret Economic Planning & Development Commission is to foster economic growth in the Town of Pomfret and "to attempt to predict and analyze the future economic development and shortfalls of the Town of Pomfret and plan for economic development to improve the Grand List and mitigate the impact of future property tax increases to the residential sector and to develop a long range capital improvement and expenditure plan."

Along with this charge, the committee will be working closely with the Planning and Zoning Commission to help determine where development should take place and what type of development is conducive to improving the quality of life in Pomfret. Once some of these factors are determined, it will then be the EDC's job to work with existing agricultural, commercial and industrial enterprise to make sure their needs are met, and to solicit compatible development for Pomfret, taking into consideration the physical limitations of the land and labor force.

During 2018, the EPDC looked at various potential uses of the Murdock Property and worked with a Connecticut Certified Forester to complete a Forest Management Plan on the parcel. This plan makes a number of recommendations, including a selective timber harvest; which will enhance the hardwood timber on the site, treat evasive species, and allow the property to be better positioned for the future. We strive to seek out potential uses for the parcel, which maintains Pomfret's quality of life and enhances employment opportunities. Additionally, EPDC worked with our partner communities regarding development in the Quinebaug Valley Regional Technology Park in the Town of Putnam. We are also working with NECCOG on a regional Comprehensive Economic Development Study, a key document used by decision makers at the local, state, and federal level on future opportunities for the town.

During the next year we are looking to strengthen our relationship with area businesses and work with the other town boards and commissions to increase the viability of businesses in the town.

In 2019, the Economic Planning & Development Commission will meet on the second Tuesday of the month at 8:00 AM at the Pomfret Senior Center/Wolf Den Grange Building.

2018 Annual Report

The Pomfret Volunteer Fire Department provides fire, rescue, and emergency medical response within the town of Pomfret, CT and mutual aid to surrounding towns. Located at 67 Hampton Road, next to the Little League Field, the station is centrally located within the 40+ square miles of Pomfret. The department is currently made up of about 27 members who act as a team to take on a variety of emergency response roles in accordance with their skills, training, and areas of interest.

Members are given a pager to carry which alerts them when a 9-1-1 call comes in from the QVEC dispatch center in Killingly. If they are available they respond from home or work, day or night, and take on an emergency response role. We also reply on the I Am Responding System to alert us via cell phone of all emergency calls. This technology allows all members to receive calls and are now able to see who is now responding to the call thru the cell phone app instead of guessing on who may be responding.

New members go through a six month probationary period during which they become oriented to the department and start to develop a training path for themselves. Drills on different topics and scenarios are offered at least three times each month. All training is provided free of charge, either in-house or offsite. Active members who meet the annual requirements are eligible to receive a per-call stipend and a graduated tax abatement based on their years of service.

, KB Ambulance is still the primary provider of ambulance transport for Pomfret patients. The medical responders of Pomfret FD continue to respond to all Pomfret medical calls as first responders only. They assess the patient and initiate medical treatment prior to ambulance arrival, and work with the KB crew to get the patient to the ambulance. This arrangement of relying on another service for transport has worked out extraordinarily well for the town of Pomfret. It has been a few years now since the switch and it has been seamless and collaboration between KB and Pomfret's medical responders continues to go very well.

The current station, built in 1976, is still in service housing the department's apparatus and other equipment, three offices, kitchen and restrooms. A new addition has been completed as of April of 2018 and it is comprised of a training/meeting room, lounge area, and storage area. This addition has given the department the much needed space that we have been in need of for many years. The training room is modern with modern technology allowing state of the art training to take place. The lounge area has given the members a place to relax after long calls and drills and helps to build the comradery that a volunteer emergency services organization needs. Storage was always a problem here and now we have a space that helps meet those needs as well. This was all done with the help of a state of CT. STEAP Grant and with no tax increase to the town residents.

There were 421 calls for emergency service during this time. These include 231 medical calls, 27 vehicle accidents, 90 fire-related calls (including 3 fires in town, 10 responses to fires outside of town as part of the mutual aid system, 77 fire alarm investigations, and multiple responses to chimney fires and brush/grass fires.) The balance of the calls included downed power lines and other public safety and service calls. The average emergency call lasts one to two hours.

The only way the volunteer system can continue to work is to have a sufficient array of volunteers available to respond at any given time. The department will work with whatever time and skills that a volunteer has to give. Residents with a willingness to serve and to learn are always encouraged to apply.

INLAND WETLANDS AND WATERCOURSES COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT 2017 – 2018

The inland, wetlands, and watercourses of the State of Connecticut are an indispensable, irreplaceable and fragile natural resource with which the citizens of the State have been endowed. These wetlands and watercourses are an interrelated web of nature essential to an adequate supply of surface and underground water, to the hydrological stability and control of flooding and erosion, to the recharging and purification of groundwater, and to the existence of many forms of animal, aquatic and plant life.

The Pomfret Inland Wetlands and Watercourses Commission is the governing agency appointed to protect the wetlands and watercourses of the Town of Pomfret. Any person wishing to conduct a regulated activity within a watercourse, within the uplands review area adjacent to a wetland or wishing to conduct an activity which requires a Town of Pomfret Building Permit must first obtain an Inland Wetlands and Watercourses Permit for such activity from the Pomfret Inland Wetlands and Watercourses Commission.

The Pomfret Inland Wetlands and Watercourses Commission continues to make a conscious effort to educate Pomfret residents about the importance of our wetlands resources. We have a link to "The Habitat", the newsletter of the Connecticut Association of Conservation and Inland Wetland Commissions on the Town of Pomfret website, pomfretct.gov. The Commission appreciates the support and voluntary cooperation that all of Pomfret citizens have shown in protecting the wetlands.

Be advised that in addition to the applications listed below, 5 Forest Activity Work Sheets were reviewed and based upon review, it was determined that an application was not needed.

The Pomfret Recreation Department and Commission had another prosperous year. We began the season on in early July with two Lego Camps held at Pomfret Community School. One camp was for boys and girls ages 5-7 and the other was for boys and girls 8-12. Lego Camp was sold out as usual! We moved on a week later with the Summer Youth Basketball Program for boys and girls in grades one through nine. We changed things around a bit this year and ran a Co-ed program for boys and girls separated into two groups for grades 2-4 and grades 5 & 6. The summer program continued as usual for girls in grades 6-9 and boys in grades 6-9. It was well attended and seems to be a good way for Pomfret children to stay physically active and to keep up with their friends over the summer.

We created our first annual IRISH TRIVIA NIGHT on Friday, 3/16/18 at Pomfret Schools, Lodge Room. The event was sold out and everyone reported having a wonderful time.

Approximately \$1,180 was raised to go towards creating another 9 holes in our Disc Golf Course at the Recreation Park.

We continued with more than a few youth programs this year including: our ongoing before school programs such as: floor hockey, soccer, basketball and wiffle ball. All of these programs have participation from boys and girls in grades four through eight. We continued presenting our Asian Style Cooking Classes at the Senior Center which continue to bring in a good crowd.

We continue to host after school youth programs each year such as the Child and Safety Babysitting Course, the after School Stay and Play classes for grades 1 & 2 and grades 3 & 4. Once again, we hosted our family favorite event, the 17th Annual Fishing Derby with approximately 46 children attending. Twelve lucky children caught tagged fish (sponsored by our local businesses) with each child winning \$25.00 cash!

We hosted a Red Sox at Yankee Stadium game on August 12, 2017 which sold out very quickly! Women's Tennis & Men's Basketball were also well attended. Volleyball for adults has seen an increase in registrations as we now have a terrific outdoor court. The yearly Family Skating season pass program is starting to show a lower attendance at the Jahn Rink at Pomfret School from November through February. Family Fun Night with Santa at the Ice Rink was canceled for the first time this year due to low registrations. The commission also assisted Santa Claus with his letter writing duties with the "Letters from Santa" program. We were able to help Santa lighten his load with LOTS of letter this year!

Our Pomfret Pollywog Basketball program is a tremendous hit with our 1st and 2nd graders in town. Thanks to the parents who volunteer their time in January and February each year to make this special program so successful. It's generally the first time a child is on a "team"!

The Recreation Commission/Department \$500 annual scholarship based on community service to the Town of Pomfret was not awarded this year as there were no applications mailed in.

The yearly Easter Egg Hunt at Wolf Den Campground was well represented on a cold and windy, March 24th, and was a big hit with the youngsters. There were over 2,000 candy filled eggs hidden with the addition of eight silver eggs. In less than an hour, all of the eggs had

been found. The Easter Bunny awarded baskets to the lucky children who found the silver eggs.

On April 13thst we held our 6th Annual Spring Social event which was held at the Pomfret Community School for boys and girls grades 3 through 5. The evening turned out to be a great party filled with music and games for the 60 or so children that attended. On May 5th we had to cancel our annual Town wide tag sale at the park due to low registrations. We also took our annual trip to New York City on 11/25/17.

The Pomfret Recreation Park was regularly occupied with various people of all ages. Our 9 hold disc golf course has become increasingly popular. Many Pomfret residents could be seen playing soccer, baseball, walking the trails or just getting some fresh air and exercise on their own or with their canine partners at our lovely location.

Positively Pomfret Day was held on 9/23/17, and continues to be a popular festival for many families from in and out of town. We introduced a new "Spin the Wheel" game to the day which was a big hit and also continued the popular, "Pomfret People Pick a Perfect Pizza". Six area restaurants participated in this contest.

It truly takes a village to make Positively Pomfret Day happen each year. Thanks to all of the people who generously volunteer their time to assist that day.

REGISTRARS OF VOTERS 2018 ANNUAL REPORT

The annual canvass of voters was held in January according to CT General Statutes. The canvass of electors was completed by the Registrars using the National Change of Address System of the U.S. Postal Service.

Registrars held a mandated enrollment session (Sec. 9-17(c) at Woodstock Academy in March with the Woodstock Registrars of Voters. We gained five new electors. We also conducted an enrollment session at Pomfret School in the beginning of October and registered eighteen new voters!

Registrars facilitated several training sessions for poll workers in order to ensure an accurate election process. Our poll workers also participated in online training available for the education through the Secretary of State's office. Both Registrars attended our regional meetings of Registrars of Voters as well as a State Registrars Conventions. Both assistant registrars were able to attend one State Convention. State law (Sec.9-192b) mandates at least ten hours of instruction under elections training.

On August 14, 2018 we held both Republican and Democratic primary elections for state offices including Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Treasurer and Attorney General at Pomfret Community School. Turnout for Republicans was 31% and for the Democrats it was 33%.

The November 6, 2018 General election was held to cast votes for Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Treasurer, Attorney General, Comptroller, US Senator and House Representative as well as Judge of Probate. Of our 2,733 electors, 1,995 votes were cast. Our turnout was 73%! There were also two Constitutional questions that were on the ballot. There were 92 absentee ballots and 29 Election Day Registrations.

Our main responsibility as registrars is to ensure the voting rights of our citizens and administer all elections based on current elections laws. We strive to ensure fair and equitable implementation of all laws.

POMFRET SENIOR CENTER ANNUAL REPORT 2018-19

Established in April 2012, the Pomfret Commission on Aging (PCA) is comprised of five members and two alternates. Officers are: Chair, Cathy Grant; Vice Chair & Secretary Donnia Siriani, Treasurer, Liz Cartier and member at large is Monique Caron-Krug. Alternate is Tom McGrath. There is one open seat on the Commission. PCA meets the third Wednesday of January at 6pm, March at 7pm, May at 6pm and September at 7:00 pm at the Pomfret Senior Center. PCA acts in an advisory capacity to the Board of Selectman and other Boards and Commissions. PCA promotes senior activities in the Town of Pomfret. PCA's scope includes policies and recommendations to the Board of Selectmen regarding the operation of the Senior Center. PCA acts as an advocate for all senior issues in Pomfret and oversees the budget of the Senior Center's program line item and reserve fund.

Thompson Ecumenical Empowerment Group (TEEG) has been managing and planning for the Pomfret Senior Center since July 2015. This is done through a contract with the Town of Pomfret. The Senior Center is open Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday 10:00 AM – 2:00 PM. The Senior Center is closed on all federal and state holidays per the Town of Pomfret and snow days when public school is closed. Lunches are available each day provided by a grant from Senior Resources, the regional Area Agency of Aging. TEEG has planned excellent programs that are interesting for all Pomfret Seniors. Examples are Exercise class, yoga, walking program, movies, guest speakers and games. There have been several activities provided by the students and faculty of Pomfret School through their Community Service Program. One of those events was a senior dance and dinner held in September. All area seniors are welcome to come to the Senior Center. Seniors at the Senior Center meet regularly to plan trips and events of interest.

The Pomfret Senior Center is reserved on the first Monday of each month for the Pomfret Senior Association, a private long standing seniors group in Town. All seniors are welcome to join this organization. This group enjoys dining out in many of the area restaurants.

PCA has an annual St. Patrick's Corned Beef & Cabbage dinner and a Thanksgiving dinner that are open to all area seniors at a cost of \$10 per person. Seely-Brown Village, a senior congregate housing facility in Pomfret Center, donates the use of their dining room which can accommodate up to 50 people. These dinners area well attended by Seely-Brown residents and area seniors.

Pomfret Community School Annual Report for 2017-2018

Introduction:

2017-2018 was another successful year at Pomfret Community School. The faculty and staff continued their dedicated service to provide quality educational programming for all students. The students of the Pomfret Community School continued to demonstrate excellent achievement both in and out of the classroom. The Board of Education, Board of Finance, Board of Selectmen, PTO, parents and the general community continued their outstanding support of the Pomfret Community School.

The school year began without an approved state budget. Uncertainties regarding state funding hovered over the work of the Board of Finance, Board of Selectmen and Board of Education throughout the year. In addition, the Board of Education experienced some significant, unanticipated expenses related to special education. As a result, in January, the Board of Education restricted all discretionary spending at Pomfret Community School.

The official enrollment for Pomfret Community School in 2017-2018 was 386 students which was an increase of 11 students from the previous year. It was another busy and exciting year as PCS students participated in a wide variety of activities such as: Hope for Haiti, Sea Perch, Math Counts, Invention Convention, Project "O", Science Bowl, Student Council, the annual Art Show, Grade 4 Literacy Night, and the ever popular First Grade Talent Show. The Drama club presented "Shrek Jr." and of course our grade 8 students travelled to our nation's capital Washington, D.C. The Washington, D.C. trip received significant financial assistance made possible by the incredible work done by the organizers of the "February Freeze".

Throughout the year the Board of Education recognized a number of students. Maggie Jellison and Preston York were recipients of the Connecticut Association of Superintendents' Award. Jillian Plouffe, Ramon Gomez, Hadley Grether, and Curtis Desabre were recognized for their success in the Letters About Literature Contest sponsored by the Library of Congress. Victoria Garcia was recognized for her Honorable Mention in Congressman Courtney's Creative Writing Black History Month Essay Contest. Avery Larkin and Graham Scribner were the recipients of the Connecticut Association of Boards of Education Student Leadership Award while Zoe Botta and Ian Wolanin received the Connecticut Association of Schools Middle Level Scholar Leader Award. PCS graduate Nora Guszkowski was named the Salutatorian for the Woodstock Academy Class of 2018.

In August the Board of Education authorized the creation of a Board Curriculum Committee which met quarterly throughout the year. The Board's Policy Committee was quite busy revising policies related to Staff Development, State Wide Proficiency/Mastery Examinations, Security Check/Fingerprinting, Health Assessments/Immunizations, Suspension/Expulsion/Due Process, Conduct and Discipline, School Calendar, and Use of Physical Force/Restraint/Seclusion. The Finance & Budget Committee navigated the Board through a most difficult financial year. In response to parental concerns, the Board of Education created an Ad Hoc Designated High School Options Committee which began its work in April with a timeframe to make recommendations to the full Board of Education in the Fall of 2018.

The Board of Education continued to address important facilities and security issues. The underground fuel tank project was completed in August with the removal of the 10,000 gallon underground fuel tank in the rear parking lot. In continuing to address the security needs of the school, the Board of Education introduced the use of *Raptor* software for visitor access to the interior of the school.

In the fall of 2017 two long serving members of the Board of Education, Elizabeth Cartier and Charlie Tracy, ended their distinguished service to the students and staff of Pomfret Community School and Leigh

Grossman and Brent Tuttle were welcomed to the Board of Education. The 2017-2018 school year also marked the retirements of Language Arts Teacher Jeff Leo, Speech and Language Teacher Blair Mondor and Custodial/Maintenance Supervisor Gary Brock. We thank them for their outstanding service to the Pomfret Educational Community and wish them great happiness in their future endeavors.

TOWN MEETINGS

Special Town Meeting-August 22, 0217: The Town approved the Inter-Local Sewer Use Agreement Between the Town of Pomfret and the Town of Putnam.

Special Town Meeting-October 24, 2017: The Town accepted easements from the State of Connecticut, Dept. of Transportation in conjunction with the replacement of the Covell Road Bridge. The resolution to accept a grant from the State of Connecticut, Dept. of Housing for capital improvements to Seely Brown Village in the amount of \$688,000 was ratified.

Annual Town Meeting-May 17, 2018: The Town approved the resolution that the Board of Selectmen are authorized to enter into an agreement with the Commission of Transportation and the Office of Policy and Management for the expenditure of all highway funds under the provisions of Chapter 240 and the expenditure of all Local Capital Improvement Funds under the provisions of Chapter 7-536, CT General Statues; adopted the Five Year Capital Plan for fiscal year 2018-2019; accepted the Board of Selectmen's, Town Treasurer's, Treasurer of the Local School Fund's and Board of Education's reports as published for June 30, 2017; accepted Pomfret Cemetery Corp. perpetual funds; approved to participate in and serve as liaison for the Neighborhood Assistance Act, and as such approve and support the application by the CT Audubon Society for Energy Conservation Modifications at the Pomfret Facility as (being) a viable project; approved an Ordinance Establishing an Additional Exemption from Property Tax, pursuant to CT State Statute 12-91(b), for farm machinery; accepted a Transportation Alternative Grant in the amount up to \$3,500,000 for the purpose of completing road crossings along the Airline Trail; and adopted the Board of Education Appropriation for 2018-2019 in the amount of \$10,072,894 and the General Government Appropriation for 2018-2019 in the amount \$2,574,410 for a total of \$12,647,304.

Special Town Meeting-June 27, 2018: The Town approved an Enterprise Fund for the purpose of accounting for the Forced Main Sewer Project for the fiscal year 2018/2019 for a total appropriation of \$264,000. The Town accepted a Pomfret Air Line State Park Trail Construction Administration Grant with the State of Connecticut in the amount of \$30,000 to be used for construction administration for the Transportation Alternatives Program funds.

ANNUAL REPORT POMFRET ZONING BOARD OF APPEALS

The Pomfret Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA) meets monthly on the third Monday at the Pomfret Senior Center. During the past year, the Board held its regular meetings to discuss matters related to the Town's Zoning Regulations. It also reviews and holds public hearings on applications for variances from these Regulations. To grant a variance the Board must find that the applicant meets the hardship tests necessary for granting a variance without harm to surrounding neighbors and without derogating from the intent of the Zoning Regulations. In the 2017-2018 fiscal year, the ZBA had one request for a variance of Sections 10.3.2, 10.3.3 and 12.11.2 (buildable area, shape of minimum buildable area, and well arc). The variance was granted/approved by a unanimous vote.

The Board did implement a new document entitled, "Appeal of a ZEO Decision" in 2013. This form, along with ZBA applications, is available at the Town Hall from the Town Clerk, the ZBA Clerk, as well as on the Town's website at pomfretct.gov.

The Board is elected by Town voters and in 2018 is comprised of the following Pomfret residents: Richard Galante, Chairman; Elizabeth Cartier, Vice-Chairman; Earl Semmelrock, Secretary; Nick Fulchino, Member; Daniel Kellaway, Member; Allison Gardner, Alternate; Debi Thompson, Alternate; and Mary Wishart, Alternate. Lynn Krajewski serves the Board as Clerk, Jamie Rabbit as Town Planner and Ryan Brais as Wetlands/Zoning Enforcement Officer.

All the ZBA meetings are posted at the Town Hall. Citizens are welcome to attend any of the meetings. The Board continues to work diligently to serve the residents of Pomfret in an effort to make the Zoning Requirements understandable and accessible.

Founded in 1793, Abington Social Library is believed to be the oldest continuously operating library of its kind in the United States. The library is proud of the fact that it served as a women's library in the early 1800's, more than a century before American women had the right to vote. The Abington Social Library has retained its uniquely rural character while addressing the needs of a modern society. The building in which the library is currently housed was built in the 1800's and still maintains items of local historical significance. A MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR OF HEALTH, Fiscal Year 2018



According to the CT Public Health Code, health departments must ensure the provision of Ten Essential Public Health Services. In Fiscal Year 2018, NDDH was recognized by the CT Department of Public Health for being among only 9% of health departments across the state to have delivered all ten services. This honor is a tribute to everyone who works for the District. I cannot thank them enough for all they do—and do so well.

This spring, NDDH hosted a reception for Board members and town officials where we showcased the great public health work—and great workers—in northeast Connecticut. Over the course of the year you too may have seen us

at work in salons, hotels, restaurants and fairs where we do inspections. You might have seen us at festivals or community events, senior centers, schools, colleges or soup kitchens where we provide education and outreach activities, health screenings and immunizations. Or, you might not have seen us at all because we are working behind the scenes tracking down infectious disease and health threats such as food-borne illness or Tuberculosis.

Over the past year, we promoted handwashing and safe food practices, tobacco avoidance, timely immunizations, physical activity (while avoiding ticks, mosquitoes and stray animals of course), radon testing, and adequate sleep and so much more, because we are in the business of prevention. This correspondence will serve in response to your request for Seely-Brown Village's annual report for 2018.

Seely-Brown Village is a congregate housing facility for seniors age 62 and older, of low to moderate income. The congregate component is designed to relieve residents of the responsibilities of living in an apartment or owning a home, which may have become difficult to maintain. We provide a meal served at noon, supplemental weekly housekeeping, 24-hour staffing for emergency response and activities. Residents are expected to be able to care for their personal needs and services. We have no transportation or medical personnel on staff. The two-story complex consists of 31 one-bedroom apartments, of which, four are wheelchair adapted, and all units are handicap accessible.

Seely-Brown Village sits atop a picturesque hill in Pomfret Center, and is convenient to Day Kimball Hospital, doctor's offices, churches, post office and restaurants. It is owned by Pomfret Community Housing Corporation, a non-profit entity. The facility is professionally managed by Wildwood Property Management, LLC. The building of this facility was financed by the State of Connecticut, Department of Housing and follows the rules of that agency.

- Weekend food program for families at Pomfret Community School

TEEG will continue to provide help both at our office and at home for seniors and disabled individuals without transportation. We will also continue to advertise our available services in print, at the senior center, in local media and through home delivery of our annual report as well as taking referrals through the CT Infoline (211). We are also able to provide this information for the town website.

The total value of services provided by TEEG to the town of Pomfret during fiscal year 2017-2018 is \$40,840 (This amount does not include contracted services provided through the Pomfret Senior Center, Municipal Agent services or cash value of Town of Pomfret Fuel Funds.)
